Por many participants and adults this Jamboree marks their first international Scouting experience. Others, however, have traveled to multiple Jamborees, having had the opportunity to watch as the Jamboree scene changes, grows and expands.

Certainly this Jamboree has been a completely different experience to that of those previously. As one of the most experienced IST members currently onsite, Andràs Soczó, 92, has experienced these changes firsthand, having attended the 1933 Jamboree as a young Hungarian Boy Scout.

Similarily, John Russell; 83, from the United States, has participated in a record amount of Jamborees, and commented on the changes over the years. "Social media is definitely a new part of the Jamboree experience, and I hope that it can aid future events to continue with the same values and encourage more involvement from adults. I think it [technology] is a very valuable tool but I think we need to be careful to maintain relationships" he said.

Frank Shiels, from Texas USA, participated in the 1975 Jamboree in Norway, commenting that the event didn't have the technology or equipment that is on offer today, and was more primitive. "Technology and communications has been vastly improved, and there are more activities... on the whole everything is so much bigger, but at the age of 17, it was still a lifechanging event" he said.

"There wasn't much of a language consistency in 1975; we would communicate in a group through each other, through the different languages that different people spoke - it was very interesting! With more people speaking English there is definitely less of a language barrier now."

Looking forward to Japan in 2015, participants will have huge opportunities in the way of exploring nature, science, global issues, community service, cultures and water activities. Being held from Tuesday July 28 until Saturday August 8, 2015, the 23rd World Jamboree in Japan is aiming to host a bigger and better Jamboree than ever seen before.
